

How Tavistock received £4,716 per pupil

Compared to schools like you: Tavistock receives 9.0% less from grant funding and 8.8% more from self-generated funding. In particular, Tavistock receives noticeably more in facilities & services and other income, and noticeably less in pupil premium.

Compared to the national average for primary schools: Tavistock receives 7.8% less from grant funding and 7.7% more from self-generated funding. In particular, Tavistock receives noticeably more in facilities & services, and noticeably less in other grants & funding and donations.



How Tavistock spent £4,654 per pupil

Compared to schools like you: Tavistock spends 4.9% more on staff, 2.9% less on resources, 2.2% less on buildings and 1.1% more on other. In particular, Tavistock spends noticeably less on non-ICT learning resources, ICT learning resources and premises.

Compared to the national average for primary schools: Tavistock spends 5.5% more on staff, 3.3% less on resources, 2.5% less on buildings and 0.9% more on other. In particular, Tavistock spends noticeably less on non-ICT learning resources, ICT learning resources and premises.































How we did this for Tavistock

Why create a report?

This report has been created just for Tavistock to help you to see the power information can have when intelligently analysed, and intuitively presented. It also acts as a small introduction to what Arbor can do. Hello!

How did you get the data?

This report has been created using publicly available information sourced from the Department for Education, Ofsted and Google, which our clever data scientists then imported into Arbor's Adaptive Management System for analysis and output. The result was an individual finance report unique to each school. No two are even remotely alike. Each is special.

How difficult was it to do?

This report used our massively parallel analytics engine, which we've been developing for three years to help schools manage their data. It involved crunching 150 million data points almost instantly to produce 19,320 individual PDF reports, one for every school (who reports their data) in England. From design to delivery took us around a day.

Why do I have some data missing?

We do the best with what we are given, but we're not magicians! Either the data wasn't reported to the DfE, or it was disguised to preserve anonymity, so we've listed it as not available.

How do we define 'disadvantaged'?

We use the DfE's most recent definition, which includes looked after children and any child claiming FSM in the last six years.

How did you derive your LA and National averages?

We benchmarked Tavistock on a variety of measures to allow you to analyse your budget in a wider context. We only compared Tavistock to other primary schools, both in the schools like you, local authority and national measures, making the comparison more meaningful. After all, a primary school's spend is different from a secondary school's, which is different from a special school. An average that included all three would be misleading.

What is a school 'like you'?

We created the schools like you measure to give you the most meaningful comparison to Tavistock. First, we filtered by all primary schools for the reasons mentioned above. Then, we filtered by schools who were inside/outside London as this changes your cost structure. Next we filtered by size, ensuring that Tavistock is compared to schools with a similar number of students. Finally we took your FSM, SEN and EAL data, weighted them 26%, 67% and 7% respectively, based on the size of the attainment gaps at KS2, and combined them into a baseline score to find schools with similar demographic intakes to Tavistock. We chose a group of 100 similar schools around this baseline, 50 directly above and 50 directly below your score, and benchmarked your performance based on this. After all that, we sat down and had a cup of tea as we were exhausted!




